United Against Slavery is passionate about collaborative teamwork, which allows all of us to accomplish more than we could have accomplished alone. It has taken a lot of partners working together to create a global survey platform for the main anti-trafficking stakeholders. Each person is more than just a statistic, they represent hard work, passion, and skills to combat this horrific crime. The culmination of all that we have accomplished in Phase One and all that we seek to accomplish in Phase Two and beyond is due to the following collaborations:

- 65 Subject Matter Experts representing 23 countries served as UAS Survey Leaders, including more than 25 survivors contributing survey questions in our 2016 Pilot Study and National Outreach Survey
- 36 Survivor Leaders are members of our Survivor Leaders Connect group
- 9 UAS Foundation and Advisory Team Members
- 9 vendors
- 4 Account Managers and 5 Project Managers
- 21 Scholars and Subject Matter Experts writing the core analysis of our National Outreach Survey (NOS) reports
- 50 Practitioner Authors writing supplemental essays for our NOS reports
- 20-40 Universities from across the globe will be represented from the Ph.D.'s and Subject Matter Experts contributing to our reports
- Unknown number of Ph.D. and Masters University Students that will contribute to our research and data analysis as we engage the next generation on human rights matters

TO FULLFILL OUR MISSION

The survey will identify gaps that may exist in services, share strengths and weaknesses, and provide evidence-based data that will help strengthen efforts to fight sex and labor trafficking exploitation. To scale our mission into reality, United Against Slavery has designed multiple programs to ensure our outcomes have the greatest contributions of actionable data to unify and positively impact the entire anti-trafficking movement.

- Launch the National Outreach Survey (NOS) to collect national and global data from over 23 stakeholder groups. There will be more than 800 survey questions with each group being asked a smaller number of questions. Over 60 global subject matter experts contributed towards the survey questions. Our 2016 Pilot Study had survey respondents representing 47 states and 70 countries.
- Form an Appropriations Committee to analyze the NOS financial data along with other financial datasets to decipher a more accurate cost to combat all forms of human trafficking from the front lines.
- Analyze the NOS data and release 50 custom Governor State Reports on Human Trafficking, a National Governor State Report on Human Trafficking, and a Global Report on Human Trafficking.
- Launch an online open-source database to allow the public-at-large to utilize the National Outreach Survey data.
- Provide our National Governor State Report and Appropriations Report to a Congressional Member to sponsor a Bill to equip and empower stakeholders in every state with more resources, best practices, and accountability.
- A global entity is already making plans to set up an endowment and use our National Outreach Survey data to hopefully raise hundreds of millions of dollars to fund shelters and safe houses around the globe.

MAKING THE MOST FROM THE DATA COLLECTED

Review one example how the upcoming National Outreach Survey data will be used to help multiple anti-trafficking stakeholder groups.



Our 2018 Lingering Medical Symptoms Pilot Study was conducted among a small sample of 27 sex trafficking survivors. The intent of the Pilot Study was to determine a list of lingering medical ailments from survivors so that we could include this list on the National Outreach Survey, to obtain similar data with a larger population of global respondents. Over 80 lingering medical symptoms were identified by sex trafficking survivors in the 2018 Pilot Study.

There will be 3-4 survey questions to survivors of all forms of human trafficking that will list the 80+ lingering medical symptoms. From those few questions, the data collected will help the medical community to:

- 1) Identify a list of medical symptoms experienced by sex and labor trafficking survivors, among all genders and races
- 2) Confirm additional medical professionals that may come in contact with survivors
- 3) Engage those professionals to join networks offering pro-bono services
- 4) Encourage healthcare providers to complete trauma informed training
- 5) Engage holistic service providers
- 6) Engage federal agencies to ensure survivors have healthcare access and disability income (if applicable) in a timely fashion
- 7) Identify existing medical resources that may not be widely known, for example MDsave
- 8) Introduce training resources to healthcare professional, such as HHS - SOAR
- 9) Equip and empower survivors in their healing journeys so that medical conditions do not linger and create secondary conditions

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Interesting Facts!

- The majority of survey questions will be asked to the global audience which will provide comparable data across 50 U.S. States and world-wide.
- There will be 50+ Governor State Reports on Human Trafficking and all of the data collected will be analyzed for each state.
- There are over 800 total survey questions on the National Outreach Survey, where more than 23 stakeholder groups will be asked a smaller number of questions. The data will be analyzed and each survey question has the capacity to help multiple stakeholder groups.
- There will be a National Governor State Report on Human Trafficking as well as a Global Report on Human Trafficking that will analyze the data collected from all survey respondents.
